### **16.**Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary education is ensured by the university via the successful implementation of a choice-based credit system. The university has also implemented credit and curricular framework for elective courses. The next target is achieving multiinstitutional education via successful implementation of NEP 2020 syllabi. Towards this constitution of faculty and program-wise BOS has been done, and the syllabi prescribed by the NEP steering committee are ready for its implementation. All the affiliated colleges of the university have also implemented multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary education and are on board to switch to NEP syllabi.

#### 17.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The university has successfully implemented the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system, and almost all the students on its campus and affiliated colleges have registered themselves on the ABC system. The university thus stood fourth at the national level in the list of institutions to have maximum ABC registration. Even to date, the university ranks fourth in the nation with 8 Lakhs plus ABC accounts.

#### **18.Skill development:**

The university has a dedicated skill development center on its campus. The centre runs 4 skill development courses. Some of these courses are run in collaboration with industry, and the students are paid a stipend while they are being trained. A number of affiliated colleges have also started skill development courses under the guidance of the university. The skill courses offered on campus are B.Voc in Manufacturing Technology. B.Voc in Jewellery Design and Gemology. B.Voc in Retail Management in association with Maruti Suzuki India Limited. B.Voc in Renewable Energy.

### **19.**Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The university has a proven record of its work in the field of medicinal plants. The university hosts a regional cum facilitation center for the Western region sponsored by the National Medicinal Plants Board and a Centre of excellence in Ayurveda sponsored by the Ministry of Ayush, Government of India. These centres are doing research, developing, and taking care of teaching activities in the respective subjects to unravel the various principals of the ancient Indian knowledge system of Auyrveda. The university has submitted a proposal to DBT to establish a medicinal plant genome sequencing Centre titled "Indian Medicinal Plant Genome Initiative" under its infrastructure grant named SAHAJ. The proposal has been recommended for financial assistance of approximately 20 crores. The said centre will also serve as a national sequencing facility for willing researchers on a pay-per-sample basis. This center will promote research and understanding of the ancient Indian knowledge system of Auyrveda at the molecular level. The university is conducting many other courses on IKS involving yoga, meditation, etc. The courses on IKS are part of NEP syllabi, and the course content delivery will be done in regional languages as per NEP guidelines. Further University has appointed a dedicated IKS Coordinator/Nodal Officer to look after IKS teaching and research activities. Videos are been prepared for delivery of IKS courses in online mode.

#### 20.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The university website displays program syllabi of all the degree programs offered on campus. The syllabi are provided with learning outcomes, which include program outcomes and course outcomes of the overall program. All the individual subjects and courses of the program are provided with subject-specific learning objectives and outcomes. These are available to the students enrolled in the program and to the student community at a large university. The objective assessment process is defined based on the learning objective and outcome and is implemented during the evaluation process. Further, the learning objectives and outcomes are introduced to students in the program 'Deeksharambha' in a generic way, and induction programs in individual departments in a subjectspecific way. All this information is available for reading on the university website.

#### **21.Distance education/online education:**

The School of Open Learning (SoL), established under the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune, in 2018, is an important school in the field of open and distance education in India. The School of Open Learning (SoL) offers undergraduate and postgraduate degree courses in the various subjects of the Arts and Commerce faculty. The medium of instruction for all courses is Marathi and English. The school is ensuring to circulate all printed material to the enrolled students at the centres. All study centres are identified in the constituency of the university, and they are fully equipped with appropriate infrastructure. Responsible study centres are working as caretakers of all learners and provide essential personal contact under the guidelines of the school. In online education, the university has two ARPIT programs on the SWAYAM platform, namely, "Teacher and Teaching in Higher Education" and "Leadership and Management in Higher Education" and "Business Planning and Project Management," which are completely delivered online.

### **1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment**

In the academic year 2023-24, the university has introduced a range of courses that emphasize professional ethics, gender sensitization, human values, environment, and sustainability. These courses are primarily categorized as generic electives within the choice-based credit system, designed to equip students with the necessary skills to address real-world challenges. A notable inclusion is the course on Research Ethics, which highlights the importance of ethical conduct in professional settings.

The curriculum also incorporates professional codes of conduct through courses like corporate governance, which aim to educate students on the ethical standards relevant to various industries. The Center for Women's Studies plays a crucial role in promoting gender studies and raising awareness about gender issues, with numerous programs focused on gender equality and inclusivity. A two-day workshop on the issues faced by transgenders is one such example of our commitment to our focus on gender equality and inclusivity.

Mandatory courses on human rights are included to foster essential qualities such as empathy, respect, tolerance, and integrity among students. Environmental education is another critical component provided to educate students about environmental climate change challenges and sustainable practices. The curriculum adopts a comprehensive approach by integrating cross-cutting issues through dedicated courses, interdisciplinary projects, seminars, and cocurricular activities. This holistic strategy aims to cultivate graduates who are socially responsible, ethically aware, and environmentally conscious, thereby enabling them to contribute positively to society.

#### 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Learning levels of students are identified by various methods, viz., use of theory and practical tests, psychometric evaluation, mentor interactions, and a well-developed mechanism of continuous internal assessment in the choice-based credit system. Advanced learners are guided toward higher levels of achievement through professional, application-oriented, or higher-skill development courses that challenge their intellect. Slow learners are supported through remedial classes, class assignments, tests, bridge courses, and class discussion forums facilitated by teachers.

Every student enrolled in the campus program is assigned a mentor who addresses the personalized learning needs of both slow and advanced learners, tailoring content delivery methods to suit them. Additionally, a buddy program, where a junior student is paired with a senior student as a buddy, fosters peer learning.

Program-specific outcomes guide students in their academic journey, fostering a comprehensive understanding of their chosen field. Robust assessment strategies, including internal exams, viva-voce, and project-based evaluations, ensure the continuous monitoring of learning outcomes. By combining theoretical knowledge with practical applications, most degree programs emphasize the development of communication skills, logical reasoning, critical analysis, and digital proficiency-key attributes for student success.

#### 2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problemsolving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Student-centred learning methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning, and problem-solving methodologies, are routinely employed by campus department teachers to enhance students' learning experiences. The four-quadrant learning approach is integrated into the teaching process. This includes question-and-answer sessions during content delivery, interactive content analysis, and open forum dialogs. For practical-based learning, hands-on experience, and learning by doing is the usual pedagogy.Blended teaching pedagogy has proven effective in enhancing student engagement.

The NEP2020 advocates for multidisciplinary education through the integration of modern ICT tools such as online video content, interactive PowerPoint presentations, and online databases. Teachers employ diverse methods, including discussions, debates, quizzes, case studies, and tutorials.Special lectures and seminars by academic and industry experts further enrich students'

#### knowledge.

Some of the programs incorporate case studies and field trips to promote practical learning. Group projects and presentations are emphasized to foster student involvement. Teachers use problemsolving exercises and hands-on training to develop practical skills. Experiential learning activitiesvisits to heritage sites, industries, etc. that would enrich the students. Interactions with people from diverse socio-economic areas and engagements with social organizations expand the student perception.

The university employs a diverse range of ICT tools to effectively communicate, create, disseminate, store, and manage information. Teachers integrate ICT tools into the teaching-learning process to enhance students' learning potential, encourage active engagement, and boost their self-confidence and self-esteem. ICT also empowers students to access a variety of information sources, fostering a broader understanding of their subjects.

All faculty members have become digitally proficient and trained in the use of ICT, which enables them to promote higher-order thinking skills, offer creative and personalized options for students to express their understanding, and prepare them to thrive in the rapidly evolving technological landscape of society and the workplace.

Classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors, allowing faculty to use PowerPoint presentations and video lectures to promote active learning. Some classrooms also feature smart boards to facilitate effective online and hybrid learning. ICT-enabled teaching methods include practical sessions, access to a digital library, online courses, online journals, and online assessments.

Platforms like Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and Google Meet continue to be utilized judiciously to support learning. Additional ICT resources available on campus include interactive boards, computer labs with internet and Wi-Fi access, language software, e-learning

2.5.3 - IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes (continuous internal assessment and end-semester assessment) have brought in considerable improvement in examination management system of the institution

The exam management software installed in the university is an excellent example of integration of IT in exam reforms.

The BEEis responsible for making continuous reforms in examination procedure and process. Around 7 lakh students appear every year for various examinations conducted by the university and are successfully completed using IT infrastructure. Out of these, approximately 6,000 students are from the campus departments. The university established its own Section 8 company to develop IT solutions. This company, along with the deans and exam committees, has integrated the complete exam process.

The IT integration processes begin with the application for exams and end with the application for convocation for the students. In case of grievances, the students are able to see their papers before revaluation of the same.

The mark entry, end-semester exams, results, fee collection, etc. are all conducted through IT systems. The university has created an online process for transcripts. The university website displays the curricular framework and the course content/syllabi of all the degree programs offered on campus. The syllabi are provided with a preface containing generic learning-objectives and learning-outcomes of the overall programs. The individual courses of the programs provide subject-specific learning objectives and outcomes. These are available on the university website to the students enrolled in the program.

The objective assessment process is defined based on the learning objective and outcome and is implemented during the evaluation process. Further, the learning objectives and outcomes are introduced to students in the program 'Deeksharambha', in a generic way, and induction programs in individual departments in a subject-specific manner. For instance, in the humanities, particularly the language and literature programs, emphasis is placed on grammatical knowledge, language skills, literary concepts, and textual analysis, which is reflected in assessment criteria. Thematic and applied programsfocus on conceptual understanding, critical thinking, problem-solving, and practical applications like managing teams, with assessments tailored accordingly. In programs like M.Sc. Bioinformatics, learning outcomes encompass a range of skills, from data analysis to programming proficiency, with assessments including written exams and more emphasis on hands-on learning through project work and internships.

University departments take deliberate measures to enhance student learning through assisted learning, selflearning, and hands-on experiences. Advanced computing resources, internet access, and Wi-Fi facilities are provided, along with elearning tools, to support and enrich student learning activities.

While summative assessments primarily include term-end written exams, formative assessments employ diverse methods such as viva voce, presentations, assignments, research projects, group projects, group discussions, seminars, workshops, role plays, and written tests. These activities evaluate various aspects of student performance, including content mastery, preparation, presentation, communication skills, conversational abilities, comprehension, innovation, analytical and critical thinking, interpretation skills, and writing proficiency.

Additionally, students' ability to plan, execute, design, and conduct experiments, analyze and interpret data, and deliver outcomes within a specified time frame is assessed at the end of the course.

Collaborations with industry provide students with real-world training opportunities, complementing their academic learning. The commitment to excellence across all departments is evident in the rigorous assessment processes aimed at fostering critical thinking, research skills, and professional competence. Integrating program and course outcomes into the syllabi ensures alignment with educational goals, preparing students for successful careers and further academic pursuits.

The university also monitors program and course outcomes through robust feedback mechanisms. Employers and other stakeholders provide valuable feedback, which is analyzed and shared with the respective departments to ensure continuous improvement.

3.1.1 - The institution Research facilities are frequently updated and there is well defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

The university has an ecosystem to promote research and development in all disciplines. Apart from the departmental experimental and computational labs, the university has a wellestablished Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) that hosts the state-of-the-art equipment required to undertake research in the frontier areas in Chemical, physical and life sciences. The equipment is well-maintained and updated regularly. Long-term maintenance contracts ensure the smooth functioning of CIF. All the equipment is made available to the faculty members of the campus departments, affiliated colleges, academic institutions and industries to undertake research at affordable costs. The university also has a research funding scheme, namely, ASPIRE, to support the young faculty members of the campus departments and affiliated colleges. The University Research Park facilitates the incubation of commercially viable research ideas. The university has a strong publication ethics norm and hosts the regional office of UGC's Consortium for Academic and Publication Ethics (CARE). Major programs like RUSA, DST-PURSE, DST-FIST, UGC-SAP, and UGC-CAS and funding agencies such as agencies DBT, DAE, CSIR, NBHM etc, provide funds to enhance basic and advanced research facilities, including XRD, XRF, ICP-OES, and advanced microscopes on campus.

The University Research facilities are frequently updated through a well-defined policy for maintenance of equipment. The Policy for promotion of research is implemented very efficiently, which is reflected in the number of publications in UGC Care and reputed journals.

#### **3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem**

The University has set up an Innovation Incubation and Linkage

Center, led by a dedicated full-time Director. The incubation focuses on areas determined by regional needs and the university's resource strengths. These focus areas encompass Technology startups, emphasizing intelligent systems, IoT, micro and nanoelectronics, biotech, clean technology, environmental technology, material science technology, and sensor technology, as well as Social startups that aim to impact communities, economies and neighborhoods positively.

SPPU-Research Park Foundation, a Section 8 company, supports and incubates companies on campus. The companies are offered office space, technology and legal support. The center also facilitates the incubated companies' access to departmental laboratories and other university resources for their product development processes. The University also provides support for filing patents (80% of which are paid by the university) to faculty from university departments and affiliated colleges.

The University advocates for students to engage in research from an early stage. Additionally, it promotes participation in "Avishkar," a State-Level Competition, as well as "Anveshan," a National and Global competition. The University has established the Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) Cell and the Center for Publication Ethics (CPE). Through these entities, the University conducts various programs in collaboration with industry experts to facilitate knowledge transfer.

#### INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

#### **4.1 - Physical Facilities**

4.1.1 - The institution has adequate facilities for teaching - learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

The university campus spans 411 acres, boasting excellent
infrastructure to support academic, administrative, curricular, co-
curricular, and extra-curricular activities. Facilities for
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effective teaching and learning include ICT-enabled/SMART classrooms and seminar halls, while well-equipped research and postgraduate laboratories are available in university departments.

To cater to the needs of both national and international students, the university offers necessary facilities such as a library, hostel, gymnasium, sports complex, health center, canteen, and refractory. Students have access to digital and e-libraries along with reading halls for extended hours. Multimedia resources, including recording studios and audio-visual setups, enhance the campus experience. One of the key facilities is the Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF), which provides advanced instrumentation to faculty from the university and affiliated colleges. CIF houses sophisticated instruments such as NMR, HRTEM, XRD, FESEM, confocal microscope, genetic analyzer, femto-second laser, HPCF, HPLC, ICP-MS, and electrochemical workstation. All departments are equipped with high-end machines and internet facilities, including a 100GBPS internet line and state-of-the-art computers and servers. Recently developed, the new social science complex includes separate buildings for various subjects, a library with modern amenities, and a 500-capacity auditorium. Every teaching department, both old and new, features classrooms, well-equipped laboratories, seminar halls, and staff rooms, and all academic buildings are designed with ramps for accessibility rails.

The university has a well-equipped gymnasium and sports complex. A unique facility offered on the campus is a Rifle Shooting Range. The "Khashaba Sports Complex" has indoor Badminton courts, international-level athletic tracks, a tennis court, a basketball court, cricket and soccer grounds etc. The students and public walking use an open gym facility set up on the main road through the campus. Certificate courses in yoga and regular practice sessions are offered in Yog Bhavan of the Health Centre in collaboration with a reputed Kaivalyadham Institute, Lonavala.

The university has excellent facilities for cultural activities. The university organizes various cultural activities under the Board of Student Development, and each department organizes various cultural activities for its students. Further, the Centre for Performing Arts nurtures students in dance and music. An auditorium - Namdev Sabhagruh, is exclusively reserved for students of Lalit Kala Kendra for theatre and musical performances.

4.1.3 - Availability of general campus facilities and overall ambience

The overall environment and campus facilities adequately support the needs of both students and staff. Officers, faculty, and staff enjoy residential quarters set in a lush, well-lit campus, complete with internal road connections. The university partners with the Ruby Hall network of Hospitals for emergency services and maintains a 24/7 ambulance service at the health center. Specialist doctors associated with this center provide subsidized medical services to all stakeholders. Guests are accommodated in on-campus guest houses. Students and campus residents benefit from services like the Campus branch of the Bank of Maharashtra, canteens, a food court, and a shopping complex. To promote energy efficiency, solar panels have been installed across most departments and administrative buildings. The Jayakar Library is a favored spot among students and teachers, housing an extensive collection of rare books, periodicals, journals, e-journals, and additional resources. The university conducts numerous environmental awareness initiatives, including tree planting, water harvesting systems, solid waste management, bicycle promotion, energy-efficient lighting, and bioremediation efforts. Additionally, there is a 48-acre sports complex featuring a gym, shooting range, running track, football field, tennis courts, and an indoor arena for various sports. The campus also includes multiple auditoriums varying in seating capacity.

### 4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) and has digitisation facility

The Jayakar Knowledge Resource Centre, established in January 1950, functions as the central library of Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU) and is named in honor of the first Vice-Chancellor, Professor M. R. Jayakar. This esteemed library houses a substantial collection of journals, books, and other valuable documents. It provides access to electronic journals, e-books, and pertinent databases across all academic disciplines. The Central Library employs the LIBSYS integrated library management system and has achieved full automation through the incorporation of digitalization facilities. The University actively participates in the Universal Digital Library program, including the E-ShodhSindhu initiative, which grants access to over 8,000 journals.

Additionally, the library contributes PhD theses to the E-ShodhGanga platform. The implementation of Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) technology is a notable feature of the library, along with the use of smart cards for both faculty and students. Furthermore, a well-equipped computer and internet center, featuring 40 computers is available for faculty and students to access 43 online databases subscribed to by the library. Approximately 5,000 digitized manuscripts are accessible through D-Space digital library management software on the intranet. The library also houses rare physical manuscripts written in Sanskrit, Hindi, and Marathi languages. Several departments maintain individual libraries for the benefit of their students.

The University operates a dedicated IT Cell that is responsible for the maintenance and enhancement of the IT infrastructure. It maintains a Local Area Network (LAN) that connects all teaching and administrative departments. Fiber optic cables are utilized to ensure high-speed data transfer. The IT Cell is equipped with high-

quality switches, cables, I/O boxes, and various other equipment. An expert team is assigned to maintain and periodically upgrade this network. In addition to the wired network, the University has also provided Wi-Fi facilities to all users. A substantial number of high-end servers are centrally managed at the IT Cell. This includes a web server, an Authentication Server for Wi-Fi access, and a Financial Management Server, all housed at the Data Centre, which is equipped with continuous power backup facilities. The University has access to an internet speed of 100 GB/s, which is proportionally distributed among all departments, ensuring that each department receives more than 4 MB/s at any given time. Data backups are securely stored in multiple locations to prevent data loss in case of unforeseen events. Additionally, the University is equipped with numerous Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) systems and generators to ensure an uninterrupted power supply. To ensure the safety of students on campus, the University has installed a CCTV surveillance system in various locations.

The university has established systematic procedures for the development, maintenance, and utilization of physical, academic, and support facilities to ensure the overall development of students and faculty. The university has a well-established Estate Office, with two wings viz. New Projects and Maintenance, each headed by a dedicated Executive Engineer. The Executive Engineers are supported by Deputy Engineers and Junior Engineers, working to develop new infrastructure and maintain the developed infrastructure on the campus. All work relating to the process of purchase orders, preparation of vouchers by ensuring the proper sanction of the university authorities budget head and the provision/balance in such budget, preparation of quarterly receipt and payment as well as yearly receipt and payment and fulfilment of year-end procedure and any other assignment direction issued by Finance and Accounts Officer.

The University is a State Public University governed by the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016. In accordance with the act, at the top of the leadership is the Chancellor, the Honourable Governor of the Maharashtra State, followed by the Vice-Chancellor of the university. The Senate, the Management Council and the Academic Council are the decision-making bodies of the University. The Senate, chaired by the Chancellor, consists of 107 members and is the Principal Authority for all financial decisions and budgets, reviewing current conditions and planning future strategies to ensure academic development, keeping focus on societal and national development; it also suggests measures for improvement of the University. The Management Council is the Principal Executive and Policymaking authority of the University and is chaired by the Vice-Chancellor. It consists of 20 members, of which two are elected by the Academic Council and eight are elected by the Senate.

Appointments of the Vice Chancellor, Pro Vice Chancellor, registrar, Finance and Accounts Officer, Deans and Directors and teaching faculty are done as per the provisions in the Act. The Code of Conduct for teaching faculty is prepared as per UGC regulations and provisions in the Statutes.

As per Ordinance 151, Supervisory officers conduct pre-audit of all purchases/work orders and bills before they are issued and paid respectively. Further, the audited statements of accounts for grants received from various funding agencies such as UGC, DST-PURSE, DST-SERB, DBT, FIST, RUSA, DAE, NBHM, CSIR, ICSSR, MoES, etc., are provided to the respective authorities. The university has implemented measures to manage degradable and non-degradable waste effectively, contributing to a sustainable and eco-friendly campus. The university conducts environmental awareness activities and cleanliness drives regularly and has also initiated the activity of a plastic-free campus. For taking care of the solid waste from canteens and Refectory, the campus has set up a vermiculture and bio-gas plant to take care of the bio-waste. Professional agencies collect the liquid chemical waste to ensure proper disposal. Zero-waste programs are implemented on the campus. Licensed vendors collect e-waste from the campus to ensure proper disposal. Seminars are conducted to train people to make all their academic programs zero waste. Every department has a committee that is responsible for identifying scrap and waste items, which the estate department then collects for appropriate disposal.

Separate collection bins for dry and wet waste have been installed in multiple locations on the streets to ensure proper waste management. The university has collaborated with the Swachh Bharat program initiated by 'Adar Poonawala group' to ensure the daily collection of segregated dry and wet waste from the streets.

A two-day workshop on the issues faced by transgenders is one such example of our commitment to our focus on gender equality and inclusivity.

Mandatory courses on human rights are included to foster essential qualities such as empathy, respect, tolerance, and integrity among students. Environmental education is another critical component provided to educate students about environmental climate change challenges and sustainable practices. The curriculum adopts a comprehensive approach by integrating cross-cutting issues through dedicated courses, interdisciplinary projects, seminars, and co-curricular activities. This holistic strategy aims to cultivate graduates who are socially responsible, ethically aware, and environmentally conscious, thereby enabling them to contribute positively to society.

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Learning levels of students are identified by various methods, viz., use of theory and practical tests, psychometric evaluation, mentor interactions, and a well-developed mechanism of continuous internal assessment in the choice-based credit system. Advanced learners are guided toward higher levels of achievement through professional, application-oriented, or higher-skill development courses that challenge their intellect. Slow learners are supported through remedial classes, class assignments, tests, bridge courses, and class discussion forums facilitated by teachers.

Every student enrolled in the campus program is assigned a mentor who addresses the personalized learning needs of both slow and advanced learners, tailoring content delivery methods to suit them. Additionally, a buddy program, where a junior student is paired with a senior student as a buddy, fosters peer learning.

Program-specific outcomes guide students in their academic journey, fostering a comprehensive understanding of their chosen field. Robust assessment strategies, including internal exams, viva-voce, and project-based evaluations, ensure the continuous monitoring of learning outcomes. By combining theoretical knowledge with practical applications, most degree programs emphasize the development of communication skills, logical reasoning, critical analysis, and digital proficiency-key attributes for student success.

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Student-centred learning methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning, and problem-solving methodologies, are routinely employed by campus department teachers to enhance students' learning experiences. The fourquadrant learning approach is integrated into the teaching process. This includes question-and-answer sessions during content delivery, interactive content analysis, and open forum dialogs. For practical-based learning, hands-on experience, and learning by doing is the usual pedagogy.Blended teaching pedagogy has proven effective in enhancing student engagement. The NEP2020 advocates for multidisciplinary education through the integration of modern ICT tools such as online video content, interactive PowerPoint presentations, and online databases. Teachers employ diverse methods, including discussions, debates, quizzes, case studies, and tutorials.Special lectures and seminars by academic and industry experts further enrich students' knowledge.

Some of the programs incorporate case studies and field trips to promote practical learning. Group projects and presentations are emphasized to foster student involvement. Teachers use problem-solving exercises and hands-on training to develop practical skills. Experiential learning activitiesvisits to heritage sites, industries, etc. that would enrich the students. Interactions with people from diverse socio-economic areas and engagements with social organizations expand the student perception.

The university employs a diverse range of ICT tools to effectively communicate, create, disseminate, store, and manage information. Teachers integrate ICT tools into the teachinglearning process to enhance students' learning potential, encourage active engagement, and boost their self-confidence and self-esteem. ICT also empowers students to access a variety of information sources, fostering a broader understanding of their subjects.

All faculty members have become digitally proficient and trained in the use of ICT, which enables them to promote higherorder thinking skills, offer creative and personalized options for students to express their understanding, and prepare them to thrive in the rapidly evolving technological landscape of society and the workplace.

Classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors, allowing faculty to use PowerPoint presentations and video lectures to promote active learning. Some classrooms also feature smart boards to facilitate effective online and hybrid learning. ICT-enabled teaching methods include practical sessions, access to a digital library, online courses, online journals, and online assessments.

Platforms like Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and Google Meet continue to be utilized judiciously to support learning. Additional ICT resources available on campus include interactive boards, computer labs with internet and Wi-Fi access, language software, e-learning materials, webinars, and extensive digital libraries and journals.

2.5.3 - IT integration and reforms in the examination procedures and processes (continuous internal assessment and end-semester assessment) have brought in considerable improvement in examination management system of the institution

The exam management software installed in the university is an excellent example of integration of IT in exam reforms.

The BEEis responsible for making continuous reforms in examination procedure and process. Around 7 lakh students appear every year for various examinations conducted by the university and are successfully completed using IT infrastructure. Out of these, approximately 6,000 students are from the campus departments. The university established its own Section 8 company to develop IT solutions. This company, along with the deans and exam committees, has integrated the complete exam process.

The IT integration processes begin with the application for exams and end with the application for convocation for the students. In case of grievances, the students are able to see their papers before revaluation of the same.

The mark entry, end-semester exams, results, fee collection, etc. are all conducted through IT systems. The university has created an online process for transcripts. The website uploads all the circulars that are adopted by the exam department and contains links for every process that a student may require. This facilitation was possible only due to the steady IT integration process set up in the university. The entire system maintains confidentiality and transparency.

The university website displays the curricular framework and the course content/syllabi of all the degree programs offered on campus. The syllabi are provided with a preface containing generic learning-objectives and learning-outcomes of the overall programs. The objective assessment process is defined based on the learning objective and outcome and is implemented during the evaluation process. For instance, in the humanities, particularly the language and literature programs, emphasis is placed on grammatical knowledge, language skills, literary concepts, and textual analysis, which is reflected in assessment criteria. Thematic and applied programsfocus on conceptual understanding, critical thinking, problem-solving, and practical applications like managing teams, with assessments tailored accordingly. In programs like M.Sc. Bioinformatics, learning outcomes encompass a range of skills, from data analysis to programming proficiency, with assessments including written exams and more emphasis on hands-on learning through project work and internships.

University departments take deliberate measures to enhance student learning through assisted learning, self-learning, and hands-on experiences. Advanced computing resources, internet access, and Wi-Fi facilities are provided, along with e-learning tools, to support and enrich student learning activities.

While summative assessments primarily include term-end written exams, formative assessments employ diverse methods such as viva voce, presentations, assignments, research projects, group projects, group discussions, seminars, workshops, role plays, and written tests. These activities evaluate various aspects of student performance, including content mastery, preparation, presentation, communication skills, conversational abilities, comprehension, innovation, analytical and critical thinking, interpretation skills, and writing proficiency.

Additionally, students' ability to plan, execute, design, and conduct experiments, analyze and interpret data, and deliver outcomes within a specified time frame is assessed at the end of the course.

Collaborations with industry provide students with real-world training opportunities, complementing their academic learning. The commitment to excellence across all departments is evident in the rigorous assessment processes aimed at fostering critical thinking, research skills, and professional competence. Integrating program and course outcomes into the syllabi ensures alignment with educational goals, preparing students for successful careers and further academic pursuits.

The university also monitors program and course outcomes through robust feedback mechanisms. Employers and other stakeholders provide valuable feedback, which is analyzed and shared with the respective departments to ensure continuous improvement.

### **3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities**

3.1.1 - The institution Research facilities are frequently updated and there is well defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

The university has an ecosystem to promote research and development in all disciplines. Apart from the departmental experimental and computational labs, the university has a wellestablished Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) that hosts the state-of-the-art equipment required to undertake research in the frontier areas in Chemical, physical and life sciences. The equipment is well-maintained and updated regularly. Longterm maintenance contracts ensure the smooth functioning of CIF. All the equipment is made available to the faculty members of the campus departments, affiliated colleges, academic institutions and industries to undertake research at affordable costs. The university also has a research funding scheme, namely, ASPIRE, to support the young faculty members of the campus departments and affiliated colleges. The University Research Park facilitates the incubation of commercially viable research ideas. The university has a strong publication ethics

norm and hosts the regional office of UGC's Consortium for Academic and Publication Ethics (CARE). Major programs like RUSA, DST-PURSE, DST-FIST, UGC-SAP, and UGC-CAS and funding agencies such as agencies DBT, DAE, CSIR, NBHM etc, provide funds to enhance basic and advanced research facilities, including XRD, XRF, ICP-OES, and advanced microscopes on campus.

The University Research facilities are frequently updated through a well-defined policy for maintenance of equipment. The Policy for promotion of research is implemented very efficiently, which is reflected in the number of publications in UGC Care and reputed journals.

#### **3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem**

3.3.1 - Institution has created an eco-system for innovations including Incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

The University has set up an Innovation Incubation and Linkage Center, led by a dedicated full-time Director. The incubation focuses on areas determined by regional needs and the university's resource strengths. These focus areas encompass Technology startups, emphasizing intelligent systems, IoT, micro and nanoelectronics, biotech, clean technology, environmental technology, material science technology, and sensor technology, as well as Social startups that aim to impact communities, economies and neighborhoods positively.

SPPU-Research Park Foundation, a Section 8 company, supports and incubates companies on campus. The companies are offered office space, technology and legal support. The center also facilitates the incubated companies' access to departmental laboratories and other university resources for their product development processes. The University also provides support for filing patents (80% of which are paid by the university) to faculty from university departments and affiliated colleges.

The University advocates for students to engage in research from an early stage. Additionally, it promotes participation in "Avishkar," a State-Level Competition, as well as "Anveshan," a National and Global competition. The University has established the Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) Cell and the Center for

#### Publication Ethics (CPE). Through these entities, the University conducts various programs in collaboration with industry experts to facilitate knowledge transfer.

#### INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

#### 4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The institution has adequate facilities for teaching - learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

The university campus spans 411 acres, boasting excellent infrastructure to support academic, administrative, curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. Facilities for effective teaching and learning include ICT-enabled/SMART classrooms and seminar halls, while well-equipped research and postgraduate laboratories are available in university departments.

To cater to the needs of both national and international students, the university offers necessary facilities such as a library, hostel, gymnasium, sports complex, health center, canteen, and refractory. Students have access to digital and elibraries along with reading halls for extended hours. Multimedia resources, including recording studios and audiovisual setups, enhance the campus experience. One of the key facilities is the Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF), which provides advanced instrumentation to faculty from the university and affiliated colleges. CIF houses sophisticated instruments such as NMR, HRTEM, XRD, FESEM, confocal microscope, genetic analyzer, femto-second laser, HPCF, HPLC, ICP-MS, and electrochemical workstation. All departments are equipped with high-end machines and internet facilities, including a 100GBPS internet line and state-of-the-art computers and servers. Recently developed, the new social science complex includes separate buildings for various subjects, a library with modern amenities, and a 500-capacity auditorium. Every teaching department, both old and new, features classrooms, well-equipped laboratories, seminar halls, and staff rooms, and all academic buildings are designed with ramps for accessibility rails.

4.1.2 - The institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, yoga, games (indoor, outdoor) and sports. (gymnasium, yoga centre, auditorium, etc.)

The university has a well-equipped gymnasium and sports complex. A unique facility offered on the campus is a Rifle Shooting Range. The "Khashaba Sports Complex" has indoor Badminton courts, international-level athletic tracks, a tennis court, a basketball court, cricket and soccer grounds etc. The students and public walking use an open gym facility set up on the main road through the campus. Certificate courses in yoga and regular practice sessions are offered in Yog Bhavan of the Health Centre in collaboration with a reputed Kaivalyadham Institute, Lonavala.

The university has excellent facilities for cultural activities. The university organizes various cultural activities under the Board of Student Development, and each department organizes various cultural activities for its students. Further, the Centre for Performing Arts nurtures students in dance and music. An auditorium - Namdev Sabhagruh, is exclusively reserved for students of Lalit Kala Kendra for theatre and musical performances.

4.1.3 - Availability of general campus facilities and overall ambience

The overall environment and campus facilities adequately support the needs of both students and staff. Officers, faculty, and staff enjoy residential quarters set in a lush, well-lit campus, complete with internal road connections. The university partners with the Ruby Hall network of Hospitals for emergency services and maintains a 24/7 ambulance service at the health center. Specialist doctors associated with this center provide subsidized medical services to all stakeholders. Guests are accommodated in on-campus guest houses. Students and campus residents benefit from services like the Campus branch of the Bank of Maharashtra, canteens, a food court, and a shopping complex. To promote energy efficiency, solar panels have been installed across most departments and administrative buildings. The Jayakar Library is a favored spot among students and teachers, housing an extensive collection of rare books, periodicals, journals, e-journals, and additional resources. The university conducts numerous environmental awareness initiatives, including tree planting, water harvesting systems, solid waste management, bicycle promotion, energy-efficient lighting, and bioremediation efforts. Additionally, there is a 48-acre sports complex featuring a gym, shooting range, running track, football field, tennis courts, and an indoor arena for various sports. The campus also includes multiple auditoriums varying in seating capacity.

#### 4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) and has digitisation facility

The Jayakar Knowledge Resource Centre, established in January 1950, functions as the central library of Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU) and is named in honor of the first Vice-Chancellor, Professor M. R. Jayakar. This esteemed library houses a substantial collection of journals, books, and other valuable documents. It provides access to electronic journals, e-books, and pertinent databases across all academic disciplines. The Central Library employs the LIBSYS integrated library management system and has achieved full automation through the incorporation of digitalization facilities. The University actively participates in the Universal Digital Library program, including the E-ShodhSindhu initiative, which grants access to over 8,000 journals.

Additionally, the library contributes PhD theses to the E-ShodhGanga platform. The implementation of Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) technology is a notable feature of the library, along with the use of smart cards for both faculty and students. Furthermore, a well-equipped computer and internet center, featuring 40 computers is available for faculty and students to access 43 online databases subscribed to by the library. Approximately 5,000 digitized manuscripts are accessible through D-Space digital library management software on the intranet. The library also houses rare physical manuscripts written in Sanskrit, Hindi, and Marathi languages. Several departments maintain individual libraries for the benefit of their students.

4.3.2 - Institution has an IT policy, makes appropriate budgetary provision and updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi facility

The University operates a dedicated IT Cell that is responsible for the maintenance and enhancement of the IT infrastructure. It maintains a Local Area Network (LAN) that connects all teaching and administrative departments. Fiber optic cables are utilized to ensure high-speed data transfer. The IT Cell is equipped with high-quality switches, cables, I/O boxes, and various other equipment. An expert team is assigned to maintain and periodically upgrade this network. In addition to the wired network, the University has also provided Wi-Fi facilities to all users. A substantial number of high-end servers are centrally managed at the IT Cell. This includes a web server, an Authentication Server for Wi-Fi access, and a Financial Management Server, all housed at the Data Centre, which is equipped with continuous power backup facilities. The University has access to an internet speed of 100 GB/s, which is proportionally distributed among all departments, ensuring that each department receives more than 4 MB/s at any given time. Data backups are securely stored in multiple locations to prevent data loss in case of unforeseen events. Additionally, the University is equipped with numerous Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) systems and generators to ensure an uninterrupted power supply. The university has a wellestablished Estate Office, with two wings viz. New Projects and Maintenance, each headed by a dedicated Executive Engineer. The Executive Engineers are supported by Deputy Engineers and Junior Engineers, working to develop new infrastructure and maintain the developed infrastructure on the campus. The infrastructure facilities like buildings, roads, water supply, drainage, electrification, telecommunication, housekeeping, landscaping etc., are being developed and maintained by the estate office systematically. Annual maintenance contracts are made for repairs at residential and non-residential buildings separately. A separate repairs contract is made for repairs to toilet blocks, garden maintenance, housekeeping, etc.

All work relating to the process of purchase orders, preparation of vouchers by ensuring the proper sanction of the university authorities budget head and the provision/balance in such budget, preparation of quarterly receipt and payment as well as yearly receipt and payment and fulfilment of year-end procedure and any other assignment direction issued by Finance and Accounts Officer.

The academic activities, such as the process of admission of students, admitting students as per eligibility criteria and reservation policy as mentioned in Ordinance 181-A, syllabus design - ensuring the academic flexibility, conduct of examination etc., have been decentralized by the university and are done at the department level. The individual department has the freedom to administer these processes within the rules and regulations provided by the university, Government of Maharashtra and UGC.

The University is a State Public University governed by the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016. In accordance with the act, at the top of the leadership is the Chancellor, the Honourable Governor of the Maharashtra State, followed by the Vice-Chancellor of the university. The Senate, the Management Council and the Academic Council are the decision-making bodies of the University. The Senate, chaired by the Chancellor, consists of 107 members and is the Principal Authority for all financial decisions and budgets, reviewing current conditions and planning future strategies to ensure academic development, keeping focus on societal and national development; it also suggests measures for improvement of the University. The Management Council is the Principal Executive and Policymaking authority of the University and is chaired by the Vice-Chancellor. It consists of 20 members, of which two are elected by the Academic Council and eight are elected by the Senate.

Appointments of the Vice Chancellor, Pro Vice Chancellor, registrar, Finance and Accounts Officer, Deans and Directors and teaching faculty are done as per the provisions in the Act. The Code of Conduct for teaching faculty is prepared as per UGC regulations and provisions in the Statutes.

#### 6.4.4 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Every year, statutory audits are conducted by a Chartered Accountant Firm approved by the competent authority. As per Ordinance 151, Supervisory officers conduct pre-audit of all purchases/work orders and bills before they are issued and paid respectively. Further, the audited statements of accounts for grants received from various funding agencies such as UGC, DST-PURSE, DST-SERB, DBT, FIST, RUSA, DAE, NBHM, CSIR, ICSSR, MOES, etc., are provided to the respective authorities. The university has also assigned the task of yearly physical verification of assets to a firm of Chartered Accountants since 2011-12. The research grants sanctioned by the University to Teachers through the ASPIRE scheme, etc., are also audited. #### 6.5 - Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 - Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes by constantly reviewing the teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals

IQAC at SPPU plays a vital role in institutionalizing quality assurance by systematically reviewing and enhancing the teaching-learning processes, operational methodologies, and learning outcomes at regular intervals. The AQAR is prepared by the IQAC. The Vice-Chancellor and the IQAC committee study the data in order to resolve the issues and concerns of the departments and faculty. Furthermore, the short-term and longterm growth and development plans are prepared as per the needs of the institutional development. Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) is carried out by IQAC, too, for which external experts are invited to ensure unbiased assessment. The department-wise reports are then shared with the HoDs, and Action Taken Report (ATR) prepared by them are compiled and studied at IQAC. The same is also submitted to the Vice-Chancellor for further strategy development. After the third cycle of NAAC, the IQAC, has already conducted AAA twice and is preparing for the third AAA.

The IQAC also collates and submits data for various Rankings, MIS, and AISHE and conducts AVISHKAR to promote Innovation. IQAC coordinates the ASPIRE and RAJIV GANDHI funding schemes to promote research. IQAC also spearheads NEP2020 policy implementation in SPPU.

The university has implemented measures to manage degradable and non-degradable waste effectively, contributing to a sustainable and eco-friendly campus. The university conducts environmental awareness activities and cleanliness drives regularly and has also initiated the activity of a plastic-free campus. For taking care of the solid waste from canteens and Refectory, the campus has set up a vermiculture and bio-gas plant to take care of the bio-waste. Professional agencies collect the liquid chemical waste to ensure proper disposal. Zero-waste programs are implemented on the campus. Licensed vendors collect e-waste from the campus to ensure proper disposal. Seminars are conducted to train people to make all their academic programs zero waste. Every department has a committee that is responsible for identifying scrap and waste items, which the estate department then collects for appropriate disposal.

Separate collection bins for dry and wet waste have been installed in multiple locations on the streets to ensure proper waste management. The university has collaborated with the Swachh Bharat program initiated by 'Adar Poonawala group' to ensure the daily collection of segregated dry and wet waste from the streets.

The university further promotes environmental sustainability through tree plantation drives, water harvesting systems, and the use of energy-efficient lighting and bicycles. These efforts align with the institution's commitment to reducing its ecological footprint.

An online web portal to facilitate OJT/Internship for UG/PG students on the campus and affiliated colleges. 500 + companies have already registered in phase I.

Western Division Medicinal Plants and Information Centre SPPU has promoted the cultivation of herbal/medicinal plants to provide employability to the tribal students/communities.

The Khashaba Sports Complex is being fully utilized for training the students using a Synthetic track, Indoor shooting range, six indoor badminton courts, Open tennis courts, a Gymnasium, a Basketball court, a Volleyball court, a Football stadium, a Hockey and Cricket ground, a Sports hostel facility to boost sports career among the students.

The international presence of the university is being enhanced by setting up campuses in Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan, and Georgia with local HEIs. 7.3.2 - Plan of action for the next academic year

- 1. Implementation of the NEP 2020 curricular framework in all UG programs in affiliated colleges.
- 2. Development of a database of 1000 companies/organizations for internships and on-the-job training and sign MoUs.
- 3. Maximum uploading of grade sheets in the NAD\_ABC portal to facilitate tracking of students' academic records.
- 4. 100 textbooks in Marathi from all subject areas will be published jointly with UGC in the next year.
- 5. The University intends to apply for funding to the tune of 50 crores from the ANRF-PAIR program of DST.
- 6. AAA of all the campus departments.
- 7. The 2nd phase of the ASPIRE and PDF scheme will be launched.
