

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Profile of the Department....

Ya Kriyawan Sa Pandita (learned person is one who is ceaselessly active) is the motto of the Savitribai Phule Pune University(then Poona University), which is established in 1949. Since its inception, the University has put objective of 'Social Commitment' while attaining excellence in higher education. The University Grants Commission (UGC) accepted 'Extension' as the important dimension of higher education besides Teaching and Research. In the Policy document (1977) the UGC states, "If the University system has to discharge adequately its responsibilities to the entire educational system and to the society as a whole, it must accept extension as the third important responsibility and give it the same status as research and teaching. This is a new and extremely significant area, which should be developed on the basis of high priority". These two noble principles i.e. social commitment (by the University) and development of the Department (by the UGC) are the source for emergence and Extension. Along with several community oriented activities, Continuing Education Programme was started in the University in 1972 with the objectives of social awakening & sensitization and imparting need based courses to various groups in the society. It was the beginning of the Department. Through Continuing Education, several programmes were implemented such as,

- Skill Development Courses.
- Courses for income generation.
- In-service training programmes.
- Hobby Courses.
- Programmes for social awareness.
- Programmes for enhancement in particular field.
- Programmes for interaction of community with students from University & Colleges.

The Continuing Education programme which was innovative in nature was successful in strengthening bonds of higher education with society. The historically important UGC policy of 1977 was followed the National Adult Education Programme (NAEP), which was introduced by the Government of India. The Department was actively involved in the implementation of NAEP. It became very successful and popular, through which the involvement of people in general and students volunteers got increased on large scale. It also sought and participation of Non-Government Organizations, Voluntary Agencies, Government Department,

mass media and individuals on large scale. Spreading of 'Social Awareness', inculcation of 'Functionality' and imparting 'Literacy Skills' were the objectives of NAEP. Gradually the nature of Adult Education programme got changed according to UGC guidelines. However the Department was always at the forefront is implementing Adult Education Programme on massive scale at rural, tribal and urban communities. The scope of the programme got widened and it became a movement of committed youth for spread of literacy along with social transformation. Several success stories of Social Enlightenment and Mass Awareness came up. Both press & electronic media highlighted some of the endeavours. Village Development Programmes were organized at colleges.

Two other programmes were added.

- Planning Forum (PF).
- Population Education Club Programme (PEC).

The objective of planning forum was to acquaint the students with the planning process from home to nation. Population Education Club Programme aimed to sensitise the students regarding growth of population and the imbalance in resource utilization. The UGC bestowed the responsibility of Population Education Resource Centre (PERC) on Department. It was expected from PERC to provide academic support to PECs in Maharashtra state (Excluding Mumbai). In 1989-90 the Department of Adult, Continuing Education & Extension integrated following programmes under one umbrella.

- Continuing Education (CE)
- Population Education (PEC)

Jana Shikshan Nilayams (JSN) were set up as 'Community Centers'. This activity was linked to AE, PEC, & CE. This 'Area Development Approach' was introduced by UGC. Mass Programme for Functional Literacy (MPFL) was another innovative programme which was undertaken by the Department. Existing Centre-based Adult Education Programme was supported with MPEL. The approach of MPEL was 'Each One Teach Group'.

According to the National Policy, Total Literacy Campaign (TLC) was implemented throughout the country. Pune District (Rural) TLC was one of the intial programme. The Department involved in this Programme with full vigour. The Vice-Chancellor of University of Pune was the chairman of Pune (Rural) TLC.

The Department sought assistance from University departments, Colleges and individuals too. The Department performed important role in it through its contribution in programme planning, environment building, programme execution, carried out supportive activities, evaluation & post literacy Programme. The Department involved in other TLC programmes. Besides UGC programme, the Department implements other programmes with the help of NGOs, V/As & Government departments.

Teaching Programme:

The said library contains valuable material in Adult Education, Continuing Education, Population Education, Extension, Lifelong Learning etc. The books of the library are available on internet. Teachers, students, researchers & social workers are benefited by this library.

Faculty Development programme:

Kargil Operation & Gujrat earthquake: Massive Blood Donation Drives:

The Department organised & coordinated massive blood donation drives (during 19991-2001) in coordination with Armed force Medical College, Pune to provide blood for the Indian Army Jawans of Kargil operation & Gujrat earthquake affected people. Total 670, volunteers from 12 Colleges had participated in the blood donation camp. Apart from this, the Department also Conducted literacy centre for the wives of Army Jawans at CME, Dapodi, Pune. 'Tribal Culture And Development : A Policy Intervention Initiative'

Policy intervention initiative activities on the issue 'tribal culture and development 'have been conducted by Dr. Bhoumik Deshmukh during the academic year 2013-14 as under

1) Focus Group Discussion:

Initially informal discussion with tribal volunteers, social workers and theater related personalities have been facilitated on the problem of cultural envasion and degradation of tribal culture by the non tribal politically influenced social groups. 8-10 community members were actively involved in the informal focused group discussion in the month of may 2013. In the discussion aware persons and social workers expressed their worries and appealed to do something concretely for the cause and finally decided to have a formal symposia or seminar to discuss the issue academically and prepare an outline or future course of action to be presented before the state government by making policy intervention. The representatives present for the focus group discussion were shri. Kundalik Kedari, shri. Satish Lembhe, shri. Ravindra Talape, shri. Santosh Wakhule, Dr. Rahul Joshi, Dr. Bhoumik Deshmukh, shri. Sitaram Joshi, shri. Pandurang Bhoye etc.

2) Seminar On Cultural Policy For Tribals:

Cultural policy is connected to all the major issues of our society. It is both a product and process, a framework for making social relationships and values.

It was first time during planned development in India the national tribal development policy has been formulated by government of India to facilitate the process of tribal development in the country. In its preamble it is mentioned that the dilemma in preparing any policy for the scheduled tribes in India is how to strike, the right balance between preservation of tribal identity, culture and values, protecting the tribes from being swamped by mainstream lifestyles, while increasing and ensuring their access to mainstream education, health care and income generation so that the quality of their life is improved. One of the objective in relation to protect the tribal culture set before the planners was providing an environment conducive to the preservation of traditional and customary systems and regime of rights and concessions enjoyed by different ST communities and reconciliation of modes of socio-economic development.

Further the policy document specifically talks about the cultural and traditional rights of the tribal's as under,

- * Increase the participation of STs in sports and culture at local, district, state and national levels by encouraging their inherent talent and ensure participation at national and international events by 2020.
- * Promotion and development of tribal handicrafts and organic and ethnic products through standardization, design support, branding and organized marketing and establishing niche markets for the products by 2020.
- * Creation of awareness about and elimination of evil and anti-social practices such as addiction to alcohol and drugs, witchcraft etc.
- * Examination of customary practices of inheritance, that excludes women and modification of such practices.

It is on these lines NGO volunteers working in the field of tribal development in Maharashtra felt that there should be a independent policy for preserving, protecting and promoting tribal culture in the state on this background seminar on cultural policy for tribal development has been organized by the department of adult, continuing education and extension on 27th July 2013.

Dr. Bhoumik Deshmukh was the convener of seminar. The very objective of seminar was to hold the discussion and deliberations on the need of state cultural policy for tribals. Around 45 tribal academicians, NGO workers, theater persons and volunteers participated in the seminar.

Eminent speakers like prof. Pushpa Bhave, prof. Pandit Vidyasagar, prof. Vinayak Tumram, shri. L.K.Madavi have been invited to contribute to the theme.

In his introduction prof. Bhoumik Deshmukh said that, tribal is a aboriginal, one of the oldest, indigenous society in the country. Unless and until we understand the tribal culture we will not be able to understand the tribal communities and their linelihood issues thoroughly and properly. And for this purpose we need to know the role and perception of anthropologist in this regard. Politically and administratively there were three indias during the pre-independence period, i.e. British India, princely states india and tribal india. Since tribal's had their own political and administrative organisation they were independent and isolated from the British and non-tribal princely states. They have had their own distinct culture and economy and therefore they were not in touch with the other society.

On this background at the time of independence three theories or views of tribal development were presented I.e. isolation, assimilation and integration.

The isolation theory suggested to keep tribal's separate from the non-tribal world and preserve their culture where as assimilation theory had different views saying that development efforts should be made to assimilate tribal communities with other communities and lastly integration theory which was adopted by government of India said that development inputs to be given to tribal communities by maintaining their identity and culture. In short tribals will be integrated with other communities.

Officially government of India adopted the third approach I.e. integration but unfortunately in last 60-65 years instead of integration tribals have been assimilating with the other communities. The socio-political activities exercised by the non-tribal's were in such a way that tribal's will get assimilated with the others. And therefore tribal culture has been disturbed and tribal's become anxious in last half a century.

Tribal's referred to a term 'scheduled tribe' in independent India. While constructing and accepting the term in Indian constitution Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar argued that "who are the adiwasis? and the question will be relevant, because by this constitution, we are conferring certain privileges, certain rights on this adiwasis. In order that, if the matter was taken to a court of law, there should be a precise definition as to who are these adiwasis, it was decided to invent, so to say, another category or another term to be called scheduled tribes and to enumerate the adwasis under the head".

Lastly Dr. Deshmukh appealed to all participants present to transform tribal culture into the entrepreneurship, so that tribal's in real sense will be benefitted by their own cultural investment.

Dr. Dhananjay Lokhande presented the academic role of department in the development of socially weaker sections.

In her speech key speaker prof. Pushpa Bhave presented her view on the tribal culture, its preservation and development. She quoted the work of shri. Ganesh Devi which is currently going on the preservation & promotion of languages including tribal dialect. She gave the importance of historical conceptions to be understood properly and truly. History of tribal princely states needs to be understood. She emphasized on the tribal education, dialect, medium of instruction for tribal dances, arts, etc. tribal's and forests nature have a organically linked with each other.while preparing the tribal development policy all these factors needs to be considered. The concept of cultural hegemony should be considered in the tribal development.

While concluding the session Prof. Pandit Vidyasagar in his presidential speech he said that tribal culture is one of important and basic culture among the three of the oldest culture in the world. While formulating the policies of tribal development diverse traditional life and distinct culture of the tribal people needs to be considered. Today's tribal development schemes have to be examined, reviewed and revised to address the real needs of tribal's through participatory approach.

In the second session titled, 'tribal literature and culture' Prof. Vinayak Tumram, shri. Bhimsingh Valvi, shri. Luxman Tople, shri. Ramchandra Jungale, shri. Sunil Kumare, shri. Kundalik Kedari were participated in the discussion. They highlighted the strengths of tribal life which are yet to be documented. Tribal culture is evolved from the continues organic association with nature and therefore tribal's should not be separated or keep away from the nature and natural, community resources while preparing the development policies for them.

Today there are so many challenges before us regarding conservation and preservation of tribal culture and their development issues. Prof. Vinayak Tumram critically reviewed the tribal development policy and programmes and stressed to depolicies tribal life.

- 1. In the third session titled, 'tribal dialect & culture' discussed by Dr. Sanjay Lohkare, Pitamber Kodape, shri. Meghnath Gavali & Bapurao Ade. Traditional tribal songs Folk-songs are now replaced by new songs and religious songs including marriage ritual songs. The group narrated the importance in following way that should be considered while preparing the policies,
- 2. Oral literature
- 3. Documentation oral tradition
- 4. Need of tribal study centers in universities
- 5. Community dialect and language
- 6. Text book on tribal dialect
- 7. Publication of tribal dialect etc.

Fourth session, 'Tribal arts, painting, drawing & culture' was co-ordinated by Dr. Maheshwari Gavit and participant speakers were shri. Jelsingh Pawara, Shri. Amol Waghmare, the group narrated their discussion as under,

- 8. Need of tribal academy
- 9. Need of scientific study of every aspect of tribal art
- 10. Comparative study of tribal arts & culture
- 11. Need of training in tribal art
- 12. Need of fellowship & scholarships

Session fifth dealt with tribal deities & culture which was contributed by shri. Shirish Gavit, shri. Suresh Pawar, shri. Ram Chaure & Dr. Tukaram Rongale. Problem of suedo tribal's, legal battle & judiciary intervention were discussed.

Lastly in sixth session which was 'devoted to tribal governance, research & training' shri. Umakant Valavi, shri. Krishna Sabale, shri. Ganpat Pandit, shri. Ravindra Talape shri. L.k.Madavi were made their contribution. They expressed the,

- 13. Need to be aware about governance issues.
- 14. Customary laws of tribal's.
- 15. PESA act 1996 to be considered.
- 16. Need to understand the tribal culture.
- 17. Problem of ashram school children.
- 18. Recognition to the term 'adivasi' in constitution.

In short 'primitiveness' should be retained while deciding the any development policy for the tribal's in india. There should not be imitation of western & European countries in this regard. Cultural policy of the tribal's should be their own. Their traditional values, morals, cultural values should be retained and application of science & technology should be made systematically.

3) Distribution Of Seminar Report To The Participants:

A brief report of seminar was distributed to the participants for their information and any suggestions. Most of the participants gave positive comments for future course of action.

4) Submission Of Seminar Report To The Government:

Procedding of the seminar has been submitted to the ministry of cultural affairs and tribal development, government of Maharashtra and persuaded by the social activities and voluntary workers. It was asserted by the volunteers to be a part of the national seminar organized by the ministry of tribal development in the month of December 2013. Mean while ministry of cultural affairs replied to the community volunteers mentioning that 'it is a responsibility of tribal development' department to consider the proposal to have its policy for tribal culture.

5) Representation In National Seminar On Tribal Issues (Govt. Of Maharashtra):

As a part of the process to persue the matter of cultural policy for tribal's our department has been given space to represent in the national seminar organized by the tribal research and training institute, govt. of Maharashtra to review the tribal development process on the eve of its golden jubilee year on 26 & 27 december 2013 in pune. I personally participated in the seminar on behalf of the department and contributed particularly on the issue of today's deteriorating condition of tribal's and their glorious history. Apart from this I had made some suggestion to improve the

condition of ashram schools in the state and also passed on the issue of tribal cultural policy to shri. Kundalik Kedari, whose organisation was the principal participant in the previous seminar on tribal cultural policy in our department on 27th july 2013.

6) Presentation On Cultural Policy:

Presentation on cultural policy for tribal's its importance and need was made by shri. Kundlik Kedari and myself for having a independent tribal cultural policy in the state. It is important to mention here that we have succeeded to place the issue on national forum.

7) Meeting With Tribal Development Chief Secretary:

I personally present the issue before the chief secretary, tribal development along with the other issues in the meeting with him on 18th December 2013. I tried to convince him to have space for tribal culture in its policy.

8) Principle Acceptance:

The chief secretary, tribal development department has principally acceptance to have the cultural policy for tribals.

It aims to create a "win-win-situation" for the university, the NGO and the users – the university wins as it is able to fulfill its mandated responsibilities of providing adequate service to its students, the NGO sector wins as it gets a responsible rate of return on its investment while the users benefit from the availability, affordability and accessibility of quality infrastructure services.

A large number of infrastructural projects languish through years of sub-optimal implementation due to lack of funds and committed manpower. This leads to enormous cost overruns and escalation, growing overheads and inflation. It is essential to remember that the opportunity cost of this situation is prohibitive leading to regressive pricing in many cases where the poor and up paying more, than the rich.

The fundamental principles of UNGOP are that the University and NGO sector are responsible for the research, development, evaluation, monitoring and community service. This basic scheme has numerous variations depending on the risk allocation between the university and NGO sector. The utilization of student service for the development of community through NGOs is the philosophy of UNGOP.

The basic idea is to provide the services by the students not only at the least cost but also to ensure the quality and timeliness of services delivered. This comprises of monetary comparison wherein the cost of the preferred UNGOP project is compared with the cost of traditional public sector, expressed in terms of discounted cash flows over the life of the UNGOP understanding and the non-monetary comparison which takes into account many factors, which are difficult to quality but at the same time contribute significantly to value for service since they are of crucial importance to the university and the wider public / students. Examples include speed on project delivery, quality of service and students exposure.

Standardization of understanding basically aims to provide some sort of benchmark for future UNGOP transactions on the basis of past experience. Partnerships are standardized keeping in mind the uses relevant to different sectors such as sharing of risks, financing and pricing issues. This helps in reducing the time and cost of negotiation by enabling all parties concerned to agree on a range of areas that can follow a standard approach without extended negotiations. While there are a number of students indicating what approach suits which sector, the one common factor identified by these studies is that UNGOP approach succeeds better where performance parameters are relatively simple and are amenable to a high degree of standardization. However, it should be kept in mind that there are clear limitations to standardization as different projects have their specific difference and risk.

To optimize on project preparation costs and to lend credibility to the selection process of the project, the implementing agency would prepare the detailed project report, which would inter alia set out the detailed standards and specification for programme. The process of selection of a NGO could be through an open competitive monitoring process to select someone who has the necessary technical skills and financial resources to implement the project as well as one who could offer the best value for service to the users. But more often than not, the NGOs with the least cost are awarded the project. This ensures objectivity and transparency of the monitoring process since a financial parameter is easily quantifiable.

Personality Enrichment Camp

The Department of Adult, Continuing Education and Extension in collaboration with Department of Commerce & Research Center conducted a Personality Enrichment Camp, under the aegis of the Placement Cell of the Department, from 2nd to 4th May, 2013. The main objective of the camp were to equip the student with soft skills require to success in their carrier. The camp was open to the students of M.Com. and M. Phil. Programme of the Department.

The following were the aspects covered in the Camp:-

- 1. Making a right carrier choice
- 2. Facing an interview
- 3. Time management
- 4. Positive thinking
- 5. What industry expects from commerce graduates.
- 6. Business etiquette

The first lecture on 2nd May, 2013, Thursday, was taken by A.B. Adsule. The topic was 'How to make a right carrier choice'. He explained the factors that should be considered while making the choice of career personal interest, making situation, financial aspects and others. He also gave real life example s of clarify the topic.

The second lecture was taken by Dr. Y. M. Mithare. The topic was 'How to face an interview'. Dr. Mithare explained to the students regarding the preparation that is required to face an interview like reviewing a subject (if the interview is for a teaching post), getting information about current affairs, information about the organization in which you are applying and others. He also explained other aspects for succeeding in an interview like proper body language, tone of voice, proper etiquette, clothes and others. He also showed the recording of actual interviews in order to give a practical understanding to the students.

The first lecture on 3rd May, 2013 was by Dr. M. G. Mulla. The topic was 'Time Management'. He explained regarding the basic principles of Time Management like goal setting, deciding on the priorities, distinguishing between urgent and important matters and learning to say no to the unimportant matters in life. The students were really enlightened as it was a topic which touches in the day to day life of any individual.

The second lecture was taken by Dr. A. B. Adusule. The topic for the lecture was 'Positive Thinking'. He explained that positive thinking is the foundation for any everlasting success in a person's carrier or life. In order to be successful, a person has to

face many challenges and overcome them. A person may encounter many failures before achieving success. Positive thinking helps a person overcome the failures and continue his efforts to achieve success. In fact, positive thinking also helps a person to be happy in life. Dr. A.B. Adusule gave many examples of prominent personalities who encountered many failures but thorough positive thinking, continued to make efforts and achieved success.

The first lecture on 4th May, 2013 was by Dr. Y.M. Mithare. The topic was 'What Industry expects from Commerce Graduates'. Dr. Mithare explained to the students that the industry expects the Commerce graduates the have good theoretical knowledge. At the same time, practical knowledge is expected from the commerce graduates who apply for the job. Knowledge about computers, knowledge about Tally, information about the general bu7siness environment and the Indian economy i8s also expected. The industry also expects the candidates to have good communication skills and presentation skills as well as good business etiquette. Hence it is necessary for the commerce students to develop these skills.

The second lecture on 4th May, 2013 was by Dr. M.G. Mulla. The topic was 'Business Etiquette'. Dr. Mulla gave the students information about proper etiquette in various situations. Proper business etiquette can help to make a first good impression and is useful for attaining success. Dr. Mulla made the students do a role play to explain about proper etiquette.

All the participants were satisfied with the 'Personality Enrichment Camp' organized by the Department of Commerce and Research Center, University of Pune. The students got an overview of the various skills which are must in order to make successful carrier. The participants hoped that the Department would continued to organized such activities in future.


